Researcher George Barna

has just completed a three-year study on ministry to children and released his findings in a book entitled *Transforming Your Children into Spiritual Champions*. It is a study that we would do well as a church to heed very carefully. In his book he identifies four life-long patterns of spiritual development that are established in the early years.

1 A person's moral foundations are generally in place by the time he or she reaches age nine.

2 A majority of Americans make a lasting determination about their personal response to Christ's death and resurrection by the age of 12.

3 In most cases people's spiritual beliefs are irrevocably formed when they are preteens. What you believe by the time you are age 13 is what you will die believing, Barna asserts as the norm.

4 Adult church leaders usually were involved in church life and training when they were young. He notes that four out of five lay church and staff leaders,
